

10. THE WORLD JUSTICE ORGANISATION

A big step forward for the justice sector would be to make access to justice a shared challenge, see our report <u>Understanding Justice Needs</u>. Where the health sector has a WHO, the justice sector would have a World Justice Organisation. The WJO would work on regular monitoring of problems, their impact, solution rates and satisfaction with solutions along the known elements of justice. A standard survey, using the networks and methods developed by the World Justice Project and HiiL, could be administered once in two years in member countries. The WJO would also coordinate research on fair, effective solutions for the most frequent and urgent justice problems.

10. WORLD JUSTICE ORGANIZATION: SHARING DATA ON JUSTICE DELIVERY AND WHAT WORKS	
Goal:	Monitoring delivery of justice worldwide. Research what solutions work best for the most common problems.
Activity	Setting up World Justice Organization. Forming international consortia of researchers and practitioners. Designing and implementing open cooperation model. Literature research.Stimulating randomized controlled trials. Developing and maintaining guidelines.
Deliverables	Two yearly standardized country surveys and monitor of justice delivery. Literature reviews aimed at what works. Standard solutions for most urgent and frequent justice problems. Formats for solutions and agreements, that can be tailored to individual needs. Processes for getting to agreements. Treatments for complications. Evidence based guidelines.
Proof of concept and partners	Justice observatories in Brazil and Chile. World Health Organization. National organizations providing evidence based guidelines. Legal needs surveys. UK regulators. Canada civil justice committees. World Justice Project. HiiL standardized surveys. IDLO. OECD.
Business model	Donor funding. Membership fee. University research funding.
First indication of resources needed	\$10 million for 70 country surveys per year. \$20 milion for research, solutions, formats, processes, treatments, evidence based guidelines for family justice (or employment justice, or another urgent and frequent problem) 5% of budget World Health Organization (\$2 billion annually) = 0.1% of world court budgets = \$100 million annually
